SPONSORSHIP from I.P. #11

One of the first suggestions many of us hear when we begin attending NA meetings is to get a sponsor. As newcomers, we may not understand what this means. What is a sponsor? How do we get and use one? Where do we find one? Our Basic Text tells us that “the heart of NA beats when two addicts share their recovery,” and sponsorship is simply one addict helping another. The two-way street of sponsorship is a loving, spiritual, and compassionate relationship that helps both the sponsor and sponsee.

WHO is a sponsor?

An NA sponsor is a member of Narcotics Anonymous, living our program of recovery, who is willing to build a special, supportive, one-on-one relationship with us. Most members think of a sponsor, first and foremost, as someone who can help us work the Twelve Steps of NA, and sometimes the Twelve Traditions and Twelve Concepts. A sponsor is not necessarily a friend, but may be someone in whom we confide. We can share things with our sponsor that we might not be comfortable sharing in a meeting.

WHAT does a sponsor do?

Sponsors share their experience, strength, and hope with their sponsees. Some describe their sponsor as loving and

compassionate, someone they can count on to listen and support them no matter what. Others value the objectivity and detachment a sponsor can offer, relying on their direct and honest input even when it may be difficult to accept. Still others turn to a sponsor mainly for guidance through the Twelve Steps.

“Someone once asked, ‘Why do I need a sponsor?’ The sponsor replied, ‘Well it’s pretty hard to spot self deception...by yourself.’”

Sponsorship works for the same reason that NA works—because recovering members share common bonds of addiction and recovery and, in many cases, can empathize with each other. A sponsor’s role is not that of a legal advisor, a banker, a parent, a marriage counselor, or a social worker. Nor is a sponsor a therapist offering some sort of professional advice. A sponsor is simply another addict in recovery who is willing to share his or her journey through the Twelve Steps. As we share our concerns and questions with our sponsors, sometimes they will share their own experiences. At other times they may suggest reading or writing assignments, or try to answer our questions about the

WHAT does a sponsee do?

One suggestion is to have regular contact with our sponsor. In addition to phoning our sponsor, we can arrange to meet up at meetings. Regardless of how we communicate with our Sponsor, it is important that we be honest and that we listen with an open mind.

"We may worry that we are a burden to our sponsors and hesitate to contact them, or we may believe our sponsors will want something in return from us. But the truth is our sponsors benefit as much as we do from the relationship.

A Walk Through The Twelve Steps *by Doug F.*

The Twelve Traditions are what we adhere to in order to make the business side of our groups and our service bodies run smoothly. "Freedom for our groups spring from our traditions. As long as the ties that bind us together are stronger than those that would tear us apart all will be well (Basic Text 60)."

Tradition five speaks of the "primary purpose," which is nothing more and nothing less than "to carry the message to the "addict" who still suffers. It is certainly true that individuals are here to find freedom from addiction and a new way of life. Groups on the other hand are not addicted and don't recover. responsible for planting the seed of recovery and bringing addicts together so that the magic of honesty, caring, sharing, and service can do their work. The purpose of this tradition is to ensure atmosphere of recovery is maintained (Basic Text 68).

Tradition six speaks against our NA groups endorsing, financing, and/or lending the Narcotics name to outside enterprise. The list includes, but it is not limited to halfway houses, detox centers and "clubhouses," for fear that problems of money, property or prestige divert us from purpose which is still "to carry the NA message to the addict whom still suffers." What is and easily confuse people. Perhaps the most confusion exists when it involves a "clubhouse". New members of long standing in recovery often identify the clubhouse with Narcotics Anonymous take special effort to let our recovering population know that these facilities and NA are not the outside enterprise is any agency, business venture, religion, society, organization, related activity other fellowship. Narcotics Anonymous is a separate and distinct fellowship in its own right. ' **is addiction.**' The other Twelve Step Fellowships specialize in other problems. Our relationship one of cooperation "**not affiliation.**" The use and display of literature, speaker, and announce other fellowships in our meetings constitutes an implied endorsement of an outside enterprise. To announce your self as anything other than an addict or to use jargon from other fellowships (sober) in the rooms of Narcotics Anonymous is in fact a double-edged sword. It is a reservation and an implied endorsement. For the individual this type of abuse can be devastating; for the group it can be disastrous. When we as a group waiver from our primary purpose, addicts who might have found recovery, die. (Basic Text 70).

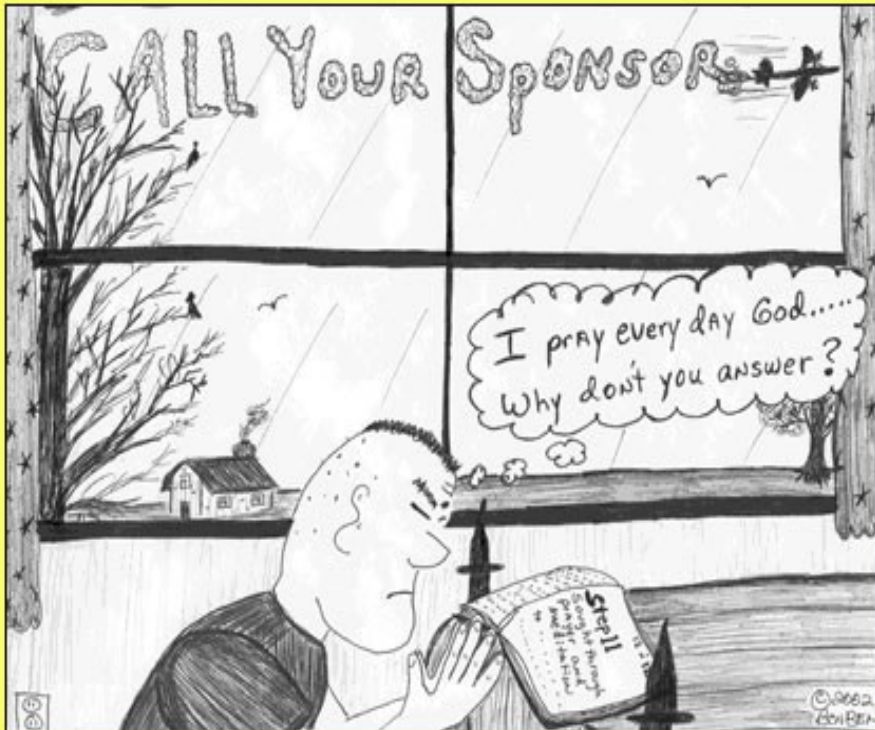
Poetry Corner
